Welcome to Ruaha National Park!

The Ruaha National Park makes it one of the country's most outstanding wilderness area, It is a meeting point for the wildlife of southern and eastern Africa and it is here that you might just see something really special

Ruaha is renowned with abundant wildlife and one can enjoy to see greater and lesser Kudu, Roan and Sable antelope in one park. Magnificent and constantly changing landscapes adds a magical touch to the whole experience. Baobabs dot the rocky hillsides, the cool green shade, along the River, the open grassy plains, all make for a wonderfully varied and exciting trip. During the dry season, when game viewing is at its best, animals are drawn to the Great Ruaha River and other water sources.

Brief History of the Park

It was during the German occupation in 1910 that part of what is now the Park was made into the Saba Game Reserve. Later, in 1946, the British declared that this area be extended and was called the Rungwe Game Reserve. Finally in 1964 the southern portion of this reserve was declared the Ruaha National Park, and in 1974 a smaller section to the south east of the Great Ruaha River was added. Finally in 2008, the Park was enlarged to include the Usangu wetland which completes the boundaries that exist today.



Most roads within the park are all weather though a 4x wheel drive vehicle is highly recommended.

By air: From Dar es Salaam and Arusha is the easiest way to travel to Ruaha. Airstrips are located at Msembe and Jongomero. Coastal Aviation, Auric Air and Safari Link all have schedules to Ruaha.

Climate

Ruaha National Park receives only one rainy season, usually from the end of November to May. The average rainfall in Ruaha varies from 500mm around the Msembe HQ area in the rift Valley, to 800mm in the western high plateau area of the park. The coolest time is normally from June to the end of July. Temperature can range from max of 30C during the day to as low as 8C at night. The temperature slowly increases over the next few months resulting in the hottest time, with day time can go high to 40C and night-time low of approximately 25C, which is generally just before the rain begins to fall in November and December.





Attractions

- **Animals**

One of the special attractions to Ruaha National Park is that visitors are able to see both lesser and Greater Kudu, this unique fact is because this is the southernmost limit for Lesser Kudu.

It is also possible to see, Sable and Roan antelope, Lichtenstein's Hartebeest, Topi, both Southern and Bohor reedbuck and it is the southernmost limit of Grants Gazelle.

In addition to this, Ruaha boasts a healthy population of Wild Dogs, Leopard, Lions, Cheetah, Buffalo, and Elephant, not to mention all the other species, of which there are plenty.

- **Birds**

With 574 species recorded in Ruaha, it is difficult to visit this beautiful Park and not be impressed by the number and variety of birds you see! The great cross-section of vegetation types and altitude help to contribute towards this. The Ruaha Red-billed Hornbill, and the Ruaha Chat, were first observed here in Ruaha, and named accordingly. Though it is now known that these two species are common in areas west of Ruaha. Geographical location of Ruaha National Park ensures it is visited by both southern and northern migrants.

At any time of the year the abundance of bird life is something that cannot be ignored even by those who are not particularly interested in avifauna.



- **Cultural sites**

The Gogo Chief, Mapenza has his burial site in the Park. This is located on the road to Mpululu, though it requires a full day excursion from Msembe to visit this site. It is advisable to take a guide with you before you go. Historical and cultural sites include: Ganga la Mafunyo, Nyanywa, Chahe and Painting rock. Other Historical sites near Park include: Ismila pillars near Iringa town, kalenga, mlambasi, Lugalo and God's bridge just to mention a few.

- **Physical features**

There is a wide variation in altitude, being generally low, between 750m to 1000m, along the Great Ruaha River and the Usangu wetlands. It then rises in the north and west up an escarpment to an average of 1,400m. Then in the western corner of the park, the Isunkaviola plateau, reaches an altitude of 1,868m. The low altitude areas of the park, the Great Ruaha River basin, were once thought to be a finger of the Great Rift Valley, but are in fact an older fault than the Great Rift Valley system.

- **Vegetation**

Ruaha lies on the convergence zone of northern and southern flora and fauna, hence has a wide and unusual variety of plants and animals. Vegetation ranges in the Ruaha Valley, from open grassland to mixed Combretum woodland and areas of Acacia, whereas along the higher escarpment plateau, large areas are predominantly composed of beautiful mixed, Brachystegia woodland.



The Isunkaviola Plateau in the western portion of Ruaha, carry two areas of Drypetes forest, situated on high ridges and one area of mixed, riverine forest in the Kilola Valley. Then the Usangu plains and wetland is a fabulous resource for the Park.

This area is a compliment to the rest of Ruaha, as it offers a complete diversity of habitats, from highland forest, Miombo woodlands, lowland savannah with Acacia and mixed woodland. There are vast wetland and plains which are home to an enormous array of water birds.

Tourism Activities

- **Walking safaris (short and long) with a ranger/guide**

While on walk visitor can enjoy the smaller elements of the bush, tracking animals by their footprints, stopping to admire birdlife in the trees, and watching smaller creatures and their behaviours without the noise and disturbance of a vehicle. The activity is available upon request from the Park.

- **Night drives** - A night drive will give you the opportunity to see Ruaha like never before with a chance of seeing nocturnal wildlife and predators when they're more active. You'll head out with your guide and a spotlight either at the end of your afternoon game drive, or after an early dinner. Are available on request, but a ranger has to be obtained from Park HQ and booked in advance.





- **Balloon Safari**

Experiencing spectacular aerial wildlife game viewing with herds of elephants, antelopes, giant kudu and giraffes quenching thirst by the river, predators; a hundred birds chirp around your open-air flight.

- **Spot Fishing**

The park is equipped with a variety of fishing techniques including trolling, spinning live and dead bait as well as fly fishing. The Park practices and supports a strict catch and release policy. Don't ever miss out this chance by planning your trip to Ruaha National Park.

Other activities include: game viewing, cultural tourism, bush meals, bird watching, stargazing, and picnicking.



Accommodation Facilities

- **Picnic sites and view points**

Are strategically located for your convenience within the Park. Most of these spots have toilets.

- **Public camp sites**

Are equipped with a shower block and toilets, plus an indoor dining area, and fire wood. No booking is needed. Special camp sites have no facilities, are private, in pristine areas. Booking is advisable.

The Cottages, located on top of a hill with scenic views are available, in single/ double or family units. All are en-suite. A restaurant serving meals is also on location. Booking is advisable.

- **Basic accommodation -**

Bandas and Rest house with shower block, toilets and cooking/ dining area are available at Msembe HQ. Booking is advisable.

- **Private facilities various private lodges/camps**

Are located in Ruaha, booking in advance is recommended. Lodge and camping facilities can be found outside the Park as well.

Park Rules and Regulations

Speed limit is 50kph.

- Keep your litter inside your vehicle.
- No pets or guns are allowed inside the park.
- Night driving is not allowed – Game drives are from 6.00 am to 7.00 pm (Except within your lodge or place of overnight stay or as an organized activity with a ranger).
- Never go for a walking safari without official permission **from** the park authority.
- Stay on the authorized roads and tracks – off-road driving is not allowed.
- Do not remove any animate or inanimate object from the park.
- Do not blow your car horn or make any unnecessary noise.
- Do not be more than 25M of your car at designated areas.
- Do not kill, harass, disturb, feed or interfere with wildlife or vegetation.
- Fees once paid shall not be refunded.
- Do not stay out of your vehicle except at designated areas N.B Firearms or any other

N.B: The park gate opens at 06:00 a.m. and closes at 6:00 p.m. Stay only within the designated accommodation facilities.
